

# What is DOAJ



- Not for profit initiative founded in 2003
- Based on quality and transparency inclusion criteria
- International team
  - Core team: 17 members
  - Volunteers: 15 editors, 114 associate editors

Indexed journals cover 80 languages and 129 countries

DOAJ is a live index; this means our criteria might change over time to reflect changes in publishing practices.

However, these changes will always be recorded in the Guide to applying and in our blog to maximize visibility

#### 1 Basic inclusion criteria

Full OA journals only (no hybrid, no delayed access, no registration to access the contents)

ISSN

<u>Dedicated website</u>

Open access policy

Aims and scope

Editorial board (inc. institutional

affiliations of all members)

Instructions for authors

Editorial process (peer review)

Licensing terms

Copyright terms

Author charges

#### 2 Basic inclusion criteria

- One URL per article, one PDF per article
  - This is to allow indexing from aggregators and to facilitate dissemination!

- At least 5 articles per year
- A new journal must demonstrate a publishing history of more than one year, or have published at least 10 articles



### Ways to search

- 1. Among articles
- 2. Among journals

Chance to refine the search based on filters (specific for journals and articles)

### Usage of DOAJ continues to increase



Greater discoverability on the international level

 DOAJ generates between 35,000 and 45,000 user sessions per day (Google Analytics)

#### All the major discovery services pick up our metadata

- 75% of traffic to DOAJ is referrals
- Our metadata cascades into all the major discovery services across disciplines, languages
  - Web of Science, Scopus, Primo, Summons, EBSCO, Google, Google Scholar, OCLC, WorldCat, Dimensions, university discovery systems.

- Increased **traffic** to the journal site
- Increased submissions and/or published articles
